What does the fund invest in?

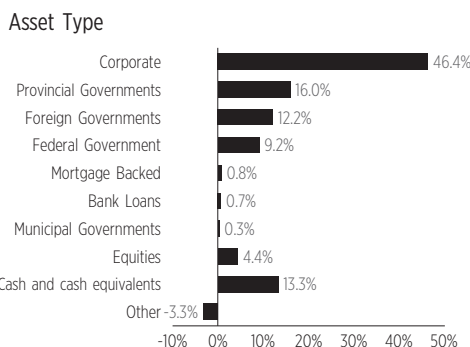
The fund seeks to achieve a high level of income by investing in a diversified portfolio of money market instruments, primarily Canadian high quality government and corporate bonds, convertibles, income trusts, mortgage securities, as well as dividend-paying common and preferred shares. The fund may invest up to 40% of its assets in foreign securities. Foreign investments will usually be foreign corporate and government bonds.

The charts below give you a snapshot of the fund's investments on September 30, 2016. The fund's investments will change.

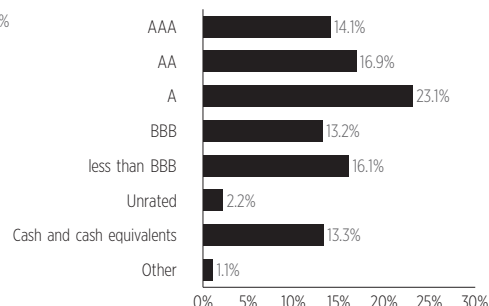

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

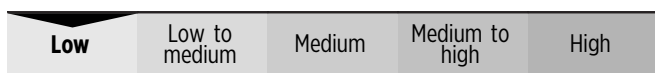
One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with a higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

Counsel has rated the volatility of this fund as **low**.

This rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

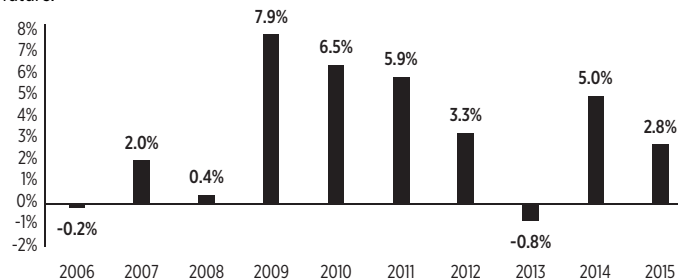
Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Series A securities of the fund has performed over the past 10 years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how Series A securities of the fund performed in each of the past 10 years. The fund's value has decreased in 2 of the 10 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for Series A securities of the fund in a 3-month period over the past 10 years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

Average return

A person who invested \$1,000 in Series A 10 years ago would have had \$1,416 as of September 30, 2016. This is equal to an annual compounded return of approximately 3.5%.

Who is this fund for?

Investors who:

- seek fixed income investments to hold as part of their portfolio
- want a medium-term investment
- can handle the ups and downs of bond and currency markets

A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series A securities of the fund.

The fees and expenses – including any commissions – can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales charges

You have to choose a sales charge option when you buy the fund. Ask about the pros and cons of each option.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As of March 31, 2016, the fund's expenses were 2.01% of its value.

This equals \$20 for every \$1,000 invested.

More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the fund. It is for the services and advice that your representative and their firm provide to you.

Counsel pays the trailing commission to your representative's firm. It is paid from the fund's management fee and is based on the value of your investment. The rate depends on the sales charge option you choose.

- **Sales charge purchase option** – 0.50% of the value of your investment each year. This equals \$5.00 per year for every \$1,000 invested.
- **Redemption charge purchase option** – 0.25% of the value of your investment for years 1-6, and 0.50% for each year after that. This equals \$2.50 to \$5.00 per year for every \$1,000 invested.
- **Low-load purchase option** – 0.25% of the value of your investment for years 1-3, and 0.50% for each year after that. This equals \$2.50 to \$5.00 per year for every \$1,000 invested.

3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch securities of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Switch fees	If you switch between series of the fund or to another Counsel fund, you may pay your representative's firm a switch fee of 0%-2%.
Inappropriate short-term trading fee	A fee of 2% of the amount switched or redeemed may be charged by the fund for inappropriate short-term trading which is defined as trading within a short period of time (less than 90 days) that Counsel believes is detrimental to fund investors.
Excessive short-term trading fee	A fee of 1% of the amount switched or redeemed may be charged by the fund if you invest in the fund for less than 30 days and your trading is part of a pattern of short-term trading that Counsel believes is detrimental to fund investors.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual funds within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
